COMPLIANCE WITH ENVIRONMENTAL REGULATIONS

State of California, Alameda County and City of Berkeley environmental laws and regulations impact Berkeley food & beverage businesses. **Learn how!**

RECYCLING & COMPOSTING

Businesses are required to recycle and compost in the City of Berkeley. Provide clearly-labeled and color-coded recycling (blue) and compost (green) bins next to any landfill (gray/black) bins available for customers.

- **Recycling is dual-stream:** fiber is separate from container recycling. Recyclables include clean, dry fiber (cardboard, paper) and containers (glass bottles and jars, metal cans, and plastic bottles).
- Compostables include food scraps, plant debris, compostable paper, and BPI-certified foodware.



FOODWARE & CARRYOUT BAG REQUIREMENTS

Dine-in: All foodware utilized for on-premises dining must be reusable.

Take-out: All disposable foodware must be BPI-Certified compostable. No single-use plastic or Styrofoam allowed. Accessories (e.g. utensils, straws, napkins, etc.) may only be provided upon request or at self-serve stations. Businesses must charge customers \$0.25 for each disposable cup.

Restaurants may provide recycled-content paper bags for free. Single-use plastic carryout bags are not permitted. Reusable plastic bags may be distributed with a charge of at least 10 cents if they comply with the Alameda County Reusable Bag Ordinance.

FOOD DONATIONS

State law protects food businesses and grocery stores from civil and criminal liability when donating food in good faith. See SB1383 for state requirements that larger businesses donate surplus edible food.

ENERGY

The City of Berkeley is committed to becoming a Fossil Fuel Free city. Due to its superior safety, indoor air quality, and climate impacts, the City encourages the use of renewable electricity, rather than natural gas, for space and water heating, and cooking. Berkeley businesses are automatically enrolled with Alameda County's local electricity supplier, East Bay Community Energy, which offers greener electricity at comparable or lower rates than PG&E.

WASTE DISPOSAL & STORMWATER

All restaurants and food facilities must be evaluated to ensure that fats, oils and grease (FOG) are properly removed from the wastewater stream prior to disposal into the sewer system. This may be achieved by use of a grease interceptor (or other City-approved grease-removal device). Large quantities of FOG should be recycled through a licensed grease recycler.

City of Berkeley businesses must follow general stormwater Best Management Practices for food businesses and the handling of pollutants of concern to the storm drains.
