HEALTH ALERT May 1, 2009 H1N1 (Swine) Influenza

ACTIONS REQUESTED OF CLINICIANS

Current Situation

- As of today, 17 California residents in 5 counties, have been diagnosed with confirmed swine influenza A (N1H1) virus infection. There have been 3 hospitalizations.
- There have been no confirmed cases in Berkeley, but clearly it is only a matter of time. Since the situation changes rapidly, your best sources for information are:

Specimen Collection and Transport:

- <u>Specimen collection</u>: Nasopharyngeal swabs are preferable, specimens should be collected using swabs with a **synthetic** tip and an aluminum or plastic shaft. The specimen should be placed in a standard container with 2 – 3 ml of viral transport medium. Only <u>one</u> nasopharyngeal swab is necessary for testing.
- If you are unable to collect a nasopharyngeal specimen, you will need to send a nasal and a throat swab in the same transport medium. Be sure to **note** on the lab slip that these are **nasal and throat swabs**. For a video demonstration of NP swab collection, please see: <u>http://video.cdc.gov/asxgen/nip/isd/swabdemo.wmv</u>
- If you do not have the appropriate NP swabs and you are unable to obtain them, the City of Berkeley has **limited supplies.** Please contact Barbara Gregory, PHN at (510) 981-5302.
- <u>Specimen storage</u>– Specimens should be stores at 4 degrees C if specimens will be received by the lab within 5 days of collection. For 5 or more days, freeze at –70 degrees C.
 - a) Labeling of specimens be sure to fill out the screening form including risk factors and the 2 laboratory slips
 - b) Shipping ship specimens that have been refrigerated on ice packs. For frozen specimens ship on dry ice.

If you are unable to arrange delivery with your current service, you may bring specimens to the City of Berkeley Public Health Clinic, 830 University Ave., Berkeley, (510) 981-5350, Monday through Friday 10:00 AM to 5:00 PM (closed 12 Noon to 1:00 PM). You may also bring them to the Public Health Clinic on Saturday from 11:00 AM to 3:00 PM.
