If five or fewer persons wish to speak, each person selected will be allotted two minutes each. If more than five persons wish to speak, up to ten persons will be selected to address matters not on the Council agenda and each person selected will be allotted one minute each. The remainder of the speakers wishing to address the Council on non-agenda items will be heard at the end of the agenda.

Consent Calendar

The Council will first determine whether to move items on the agenda for "Action" or "Information" to the "Consent Calendar", or move "Consent Calendar" items to "Action." Items that remain on the "Consent Calendar" are voted on in one motion as a group. "Information" items are not discussed or acted upon at the Council meeting unless they are moved to "Action" or "Consent".

No additional items can be moved onto the Consent Calendar once public comment has commenced. At any time during, or immediately after, public comment on Information and Consent items, any Councilmember may move any Information or Consent item to "Action." Following this, the Council will vote on the items remaining on the Consent Calendar in one motion.

For items moved to the Action Calendar from the Consent Calendar or Information Calendar, persons who spoke on the item during the Consent Calendar public comment period may speak again at the time the matter is taken up during the Action Calendar.

Public Comment on Consent Calendar and Information Items Only: The Council will take public comment on any items that are either on the amended Consent Calendar or the Information Calendar. Speakers will be entitled to two minutes each to speak in opposition to or support of Consent Calendar and Information Items. A speaker may only speak once during the period for public comment on Consent Calendar and Information items.

- 2. Send copies of this resolution to the Alameda County Board of Supervisors prior to their next Board meeting where the proposal will be voted on April 21, 2020.

BACKGROUND

At the March 24, 2020 meeting of the Alameda County Board of Supervisors, the Alameda County Sheriff Ahern introduced an item: "Authorize additional staffing and related costs at the Santa Rita Jail for the Sheriff's Office and Health Care Services Agency/Behavioral Health Services." Board President Richard Valle announced at the meeting that this item was tabled to the next meeting. On March 31, the item was tabled again, until April 21.

The Alameda County Sheriff is proposing a funding increase commitment of \$255 million over the course of the next three fiscal years (\$85 million/year) for the Sheriff's Office (ACSO) and Alameda County Behavioral Health (ACBH) staffing at Santa Rita Jail, including 216 deputies, 47 non-sworn ACSO staff, and 103 ACBH staff. Should the Board of Supervisors approve this item, it would be reflected in the County's Fiscal Year 2020-21 Proposed Budget. This is on top of the Sheriff's Office 2019-2020 annual budget of \$452 million.

The Sheriff's funding request is inappropriate in the midst of a climate and health crisis, and lacks documentation to substantiate the requested funding and staffing increase for the jail. In addition, there has been no discussion or analysis of the fiscal impacts on the county and cities due to the COVID-19 crisis. The proposal prioritizes jail solutions over non-custody remedies, while the jail population has been in decline for the last ten years.

This proposal comes at a time when residents throughout our city and county are being laid off and filing unemployment at unprecedented rates. The people's needs will look very differently when cities throughout the county discuss next their fiscal year budgets. The crisis has exposed fundamental faults in the nation's and the County's public health systems; addressing these should be the County's priority.

The first cases of COVID-19 at Santa Rita Jail were announced on March 26, when a nurse working in the jail confirmed positive, and on April 4, when an inmate was confirmed positive. Lack of healthcare and sanitation in Santa Rita had already led to multiple class action lawsuits. Conditions of confinement in jails and prisons in other parts of the United States have led to COVID-19 outbreaks, such as in Rikers Island, New York, and Stateville, Illinois, where 647 and 82 prisoners and staff, respectively, have been infected; prisoners have died from the virus at both jails. In light of the serious and urgent public health risks, the County should focus attention on preventing a COVID-19 outbreak in Santa Rita, including by further reducing the jail population.

County funds and resources should be directed to cities and communities to address the COVID-19 pandemic during this time of crisis. Currently, there have been numerous requests to audit the Sheriff's Office budget, but an audit has not been conducted. Increasing the Sheriff's budget prior to an audit is not fiscally responsible. An \$85 million increase during a COVID-19 pandemic is unacceptable, and is the opposite of what needs to be prioritized in the middle of a health and economic crisis.

The State of California has built twenty-one state prisons since 1980, while investments in health, education, and services were cut. Now is not the time. We must oppose this proposal by the Alameda County Sheriff's office. We must continue to divest from jails, prisons, and detention centers. The public health crisis of the COVID-19 pandemic, as well as the homelessness and affordable housing crisis, and preparation for the next pending climate-related emergencies are the priorities that deserve additional funding.

ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY

Opposing the use of limited taxpayer dollars for incarceration when those funds can be used to protect our communities during this climate and health crisis is an act of environmental sustainability.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL FOR THE CITY OF BERKELEY OPPOSING THE ALAMEDA COUNTY SHERIFF PROPOSAL TO RECEIVE AN ADDITIONAL \$85 MILLION ANNUALLY TO DRAMATICALLY INCREASE THE SHERIFF'S OFFICE BUDGET ESPECIALLY FOR SANTA RITA JAIL DURING A PANDEMIC CRISIS

WHEREAS, At the March 24th and March 31, 2020 meetings of the Alameda County Board of Supervisors, the County Sheriff introduced an item: "Authorize additional staffing and related costs at the Santa Rita Jail for the Sheriff's Office and Health Care Services Agency/Behavioral Health Services," which was rescheduled for consideration on April 21; and

WHEREAS, The County Sheriff proposes a funding increase commitment of \$255 million over the course of the next three fiscal years (\$85 million/year) for the Sheriff's Office (ACSO) and Alameda County Behavioral Health (ACBH) staffing at Santa Rita Jail, including 216 deputies, 47 non-sworn ACSO staff, and 103 ACBH staff at Santa Rita Jail which, if approved by the Board, would be reflected in the County's Fiscal Year 2020-21 Proposed Budget, in addition to the Sheriff's Office annual \$452 million budget; and

WHEREAS, The State of California has built twenty-one state prisons since 1980, while investments in health, education, and services were cut; and

WHEREAS, This proposal comes at a time when residents throughout our city and county are being laid off and filing for unemployment at unprecedented rates, and community needs will look very different when the County and cities throughout the County discuss next fiscal year budgets; and

WHEREAS, Although the crisis has exposed fundamental faults in the nation's and the County's public health systems, and the fiscal impacts on the county and cities as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic are rapidly growing and are likely to be severe, yet to date there has been little analysis by the County of these fiscal impacts; and

WHEREAS, The City Council adopted a resolution in 2018 supporting community requests for a performance and financial audit of the Sheriff's Office to examine jail costs, staffing, as well as policies and practices that have led to a large number of in-custody deaths; and

WHEREAS, Lack of healthcare and sanitation in Santa Rita Jail has led to multiple class action lawsuits, while conditions of confinement in jails and prisons in other parts of the United States make social distancing impossible and have led to COVID-19 outbreaks, such as in Rikers Island, NY, and Stateville, Illinois, where 647 and 82 prisoners and staff, respectively, have been infected, and prisoners have died from the virus at both jails, and in light of the serious and urgent public health risks, there is an urgent need to prevent a COVID-19 outbreak in Santa Rita, including by further reducing the jail population, and

WHEREAS, County funds and resources should be focused on helping cities to address our communities' needs during the health and economic crisis resulting from the COVID-19 pandemics; and

WHEREAS, Our communities have an imperative to reinvest many resources currently dedicated to jails, prisons, detention centers, and policing, in order to address critical needs related to public health, homelessness, and climate emergencies; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council for the City of Berkeley hereby adopts this resolution opposing the Alameda County Sheriff's office proposal to receive an increase of \$85 million annually for the Santa Rita Jail budget; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, After reviewing the proposal by the County Sheriff, the Berkeley City Council finds that this funding request is inappropriate and lacks documentation to substantiate the requested funding and staffing increase for the Sheriff's Office and the jail, and that the proposal prioritizes jail solutions over non-custody remedies, although jail staffing needs are in flux; and

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, The Berkeley City Council will send copies of this resolution to the Alameda County Board of Supervisors prior to their next Board meeting where the proposal will be considered on April 21, 2020.

BACKGROUND

In light of the <u>news of community spread in Berkeley</u>, which disproportionately places individuals in encampments and shelters at risk, more than ever, it is the utmost urgency to enact a written moratorium of enforcements of the BMC Chapter 14.48 Sidewalk Ordinance, 3x3 regulation, Encampment Evictions, Sweeps, RV Parking and the towing/ticketing/impounding of vehicles used for shelter during the COVID 19 Pandemic.

The City of Berkeley has not enacted a formal, written, moratorium. Fear of displacement causes barriers to individuals adequately sheltering in place to protect themselves and others in the community by causing a constant state of insecurity, as well as unneeded mental and psychological duress. Having the moratorium confirmed in writing would alleviate such stress and enable residents to practice the public health recommendations by experts and major authorities.

With one COVID-19 related death in Berkeley and the recent news of 70 homeless individuals in an SF shelter testing positive for COVID-19, there is an urgent need to fully consider the wellbeing of the unhoused community.

The emergence of COVID-19 (Coronavirus) has resulted in thousands of deaths nationwide and worldwide. The Coronavirus death toll is highest for seniors aged sixty or older, and others with compromised immune systems, have had a heart attack or other health complexities. As of April 13, 2020, there are 38 lab-confirmed cases and one death attributed to COVID-19 in Berkeley.

According to the <u>Center of Disease Control</u>, as of April 14, 2020 there were 579,005 cases of COVID 19 throughout the United States including 22,252 fatalities. These numbers increase hourly. In light of new CDC guidelines and the risk of spreading COVID19 in Berkeley, it disproportionately places individuals in encampments and shelters at risk.

On March 4, 2020, Governor Gavin Newsome's Executive Order proclaimed a State of Emergency to exist in California as a result of the threat of COVID-19; and

The <u>City of Berkeley Health Officer ordered</u> all residents to shelter at home, leaving only to receive or provide essential services, effective 12:01 AM, Tuesday, March 17, 2020 due to the Coronavirus (COVID 19 Pandemic.

On March 17, 2020, the Berkeley City Council approved several measures in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, such as adopting the recommendations prompted by the Demands from Grassroots Organizers Concerning COVID-19 to inform the City of Berkeley's emergency response to the Coronavirus.

On the week of March 17, 2020, several Bay Area counties (Alameda, Contra Costa, Marin, San Francisco, San Mateo, and Santa Clara) issued "Shelter In Place" orders, directing nearly seven million residents to stay home through April 7, 2020. This order was the strongest and most serious effort at that point in the U.S. to contain the spread of the coronavirus and forestall health systems from becoming overwhelmed with new cases. County health officials convened prior to issuing the orders and concluded the stay-at-home orders were necessary to slow the spread of the pandemic.

On March 19, 2020, Governor Newsom announced a statewide stay-at-home order to reduce the spread of COVID-19.

Currently, our current city statistics only reflect lab-confirmed cases, and not the total number of people in Berkeley infected with COVID-19, which we know is much larger. Data shows a substantial community spread in our area. Many people with COVID-19 experience mild or no symptoms, but they can still spread the disease to others. Additionally, many people with symptoms are not included in this count due to limitations on testing.

In February 2019, the Berkeley City Council approved a measure: "Referral Responses: Managing Recreational Vehicle (RV) Parking," which prohibits overnight RV parking. The measure negatively impacts unhoused residents, creating new problems and the fear of being towed or red tagged, due to the enforcement of this measure.

In October 2018, Berkeley City Council approved an ordinance: "Adoption of Administrative Regulations Regarding Temporary Non-Commercial Objects on Sidewalks and Parklets and amended the <u>BMC Chapter 14.48</u>", which negatively affects unhoused residents especially those living with tents, reducing their personal belongings to a 3 by 3 feet square. The ordinance has displaced many unsheltered residents.

On any given night, more than 1,000 Berkeley residents do not have shelter (i.e. living outdoors in tents, on sidewalks or in vehicles) according to the <u>Alameda County 2019 Point-In-Time</u> <u>Count</u>. A growing number of residents are housing insecure and at risk of becoming homeless. A majority of unhoused Berkeley residents are people of color, seniors and disabled. Any type of policy, measure or action that criminalizes and/or displaces our unhoused residents during the COVID 19 pandemic is cruel and unusual punishment.

As the public health emergency intensifies and the number of people infected by the COVID-19 virus increases, the City of Berkeley needs to protect our unhoused communities that are particularly vulnerable and high risk. Every resident has been instructed to prioritize public health through safe measures, and we must also take steps to ensure the safety of our most vulnerable populations. Any type of enforcement by the City (i.e. sidewalk ordinance, encampments evictions, sweeps, RV Parking and the towing/ticketing/impounding of vehicles used for shelter) will not only disrupt and displace unhoused residents during this COVID 19 pandemic crisis, but will exacerbate the risk and danger of the public health and safety of all residents in the City.

This measure will also make people feel more secure, and will enable them to practice CDC and HUD guidelines for appropriate physical distancing in encampments and sidewalks.

As the "stay at home" order from California Governor Newsom has been in effect since late March, the City of Berkeley has a duty to assist all residents to safely "shelter in place." The risk of spreading COVID19 disproportionately places individuals in encampments, living in tents and shelters at a greater risk. The City of Berkeley should limit the exposure of community spread of our citizenry and beyond by implementing a moratorium on enforcement of encampments, the sidewalk ordinance and towing or citations for RV's and other vehicles as homes, parking on our streets.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The cost of enforcement will be diverted, including the cost of the staff time dedicated to the sidewalk ordinance, encampment evictions/ closures and RV towing which can be redirected to address the COVID 19 pandemic or other expenses.

ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY

Protecting the most vulnerable is itself an act of environmental sustainability.
