



Census 2020 is Radically Different



Fear & Distrust

- Distrust of government
- Data privacy concerns
- Previously proposed citizenship question
- U.S. GAO predicts a 17% reduction in selfresponse

First Digital Census

- Most households prompted to take the Census online
- Available on mobile devices
- Can also be taken by phone or on paper

Logistics

- Census Bureau has limited resources and staffing
- One trial Census completed (usually 3 are conducted)
- Fewer follow-up visits than previous years
- Anticipated challenges in hiring enumerators & those with language access

Language Barriers

- Not available in all languages spoken in Alameda County
- Census Bureau will produce 59 languages by video and glossary guides
- Alameda County will provide materials in additional languages

Data Privacy and Confidentiality





- It is illegal to disclose any personally identifiable information.
- Personal information cannot be used against respondents by any government agency or court.
- Census Bureau employees take a lifelong oath of office.
- Violators would face a federal prison sentence
 & / or a fine up to \$250,000.





Interested in helping your community? Looking for a job that works with your schedule? Apply to be an Enumerator with the U.S. Census Bureau today!

Enumerators are needed to interview and count residents of Alameda County for Census 2020. Applicants who can work evenings and weekends are preferred. Desired candidates enjoy working with people and are comfortable interacting with new people in new locations.

\$25 Hourly Rate (+ Paid Training) through Dec. 2019

Selection process begins

Staff hired to work March - July 2020

To be an eligible 2020 Census Enumerator, you must*:

- Be at least 18 years old
- Have a valid Social Security number
- Be a U.S. citizen
- Have a valid and active e-mail address
- Complete a job application with assessment questions answered
- · Be registered with the Selective Service System or have a qualifying exemption (only for males born after Dec. 31, 1959)
- · Pass a Census criminal background check, including fingerprinting
- · Complete enumerator training
- Be available to work flexible hours, which can include days. evenings, and/or weekends
- Have access to transportation, a vehicle with valid driver's license or public transit If you are employed elsewhere, your current job must be compatible with Census Bureau employment and not create a conflict of interest. You must not engage in any partisan political activity while on duty.
