COMING SUMMER 2024-ARTWORK CELEBRATION

In Summer 2024, the beloved "Ohlone Journey" mural at the center of the newly renovated Ohlone Park will be joined by new artwork elements designed by the mural's creator, Jean LaMarr. The artist has been working with a public art fabrication consultant (Jeremy Kaplan) to create two new stone benches featuring her drawings of salmon swimming upstream. These benches will be installed in a small seating area on the northwest side of the mural. Installed alongside the new art benches will be a grinding rock that Jean designed to be used for demonstrations of acorn grinding. Jean was inspired to create a space for the preservation of Ohlone cultural practices and community gathering to be installed alongside her four-part mural which celebrates the lives and culture of the indigenous people of the Bay Area.
