


Background on Redistricting

Redistricting in Berkeley is the process and action of drawing boundaries for electoral districts -- districts that represent us (the people). It happens every 10 years after the Census is conducted.

Redistricting is important because...

- It directly impacts communities' access to political power through elections, which then impacts laws and policies that are voted for by the people or by their representatives.
- It changes the identity, allegiance, and political priorities of a district's representative (i.e., on the economy, environment, zoning, schools, jobs).
- Its effects remain for at least the next ten years until the redistricting process happens again.

Redistricting maps take into consideration:



Maps must also meet legal requirements.

Redistricting maps must also meet legal requirements.

Federal

- **U.S. Constitution**
 - (Substantially) equal population: one person, one vote
 - No requirement of “mathematical exactitude”- some deviation (<10%) permitted to serve legitimate governmental interests
- **Voting Rights Act of 1965 (VRA)** - No discrimination based on race, color or membership in a language minority group

California Voting Rights Act / State Fair Maps Act / Berkeley City Charter

- Must not be influenced politically
- Cohesiveness
- Contiguity
- Compactness
- Communities of Interest
- Process Requirements
 - Public Hearings
 - Public Participation
 - Language Accessibility
 - Notice and Scheduling of Meetings
 - Ability for Public to Submit Maps


Redistricting maps cannot favor or discriminate against an incumbent or candidate and will not consider the residence of sitting Councilmembers.

Redistricting in Berkeley and the Independent Redistricting Commission

Brief History of Council Districts in Berkeley

- **1986** - Charter Amendment: Transition from at-large to districts; Redistricting conducted by Council
- **1990** - Census and Redistricting Process
- **2000** - Census and Redistricting Process (first map successfully referended; second map adopted)
- **2010** - Census and Redistricting Process
 - **2011** - Redistricting Process 1: No Map Adopted
 - **2012** - Charter Amendment: more flexibility with district boundaries; better definitions for redistricting terms
 - **2013 and 2014** - Redistricting Process 2: Map adopted, despite referendum; voters approved new districts
- **2016** - Measure W1 passed by voters to amend the City's Charter, transferring responsibility for drawing electoral boundaries from the City Council to an Independent Redistricting Commission
- **2021** - Selection of district and at-large commissioners and their alternates for the Independent Redistricting Commission; Commission initiates redistricting process

Mandates of the Independent Redistricting Commission



- Comply with the U.S. Constitution and Federal Voting Rights Act



- Comply with statutes of US, State of California, and City Charter



- Districts will be geographically contiguous, cohesive, integral, compact



- Minimize divisions of neighborhoods and Communities of Interest



- Cannot favor or discriminate against an incumbent or candidate



- Shall not consider the residence of sitting Councilmembers

Commission may also establish additional criteria that complies with the priorities listed above.

The tasks of the Redistricting Commission include:

- Approving new boundaries without bias or discrimination
- Receiving input and maps from the public
- Deciding final map boundaries

City Staff Support

- The IRC receives support from City of Berkeley departments: Information Technology, City Attorney, and City Clerk

Eligibility for the Independent Redistricting Commission

Requirements to serve on the commission:

- 18 years or older
- Berkeley resident

Disclosures / Limitations:

- Current City board members/commissioners
- Contributions to candidates in last 4 years

Ineligible:

- City of Berkeley employees; qualified candidates for Mayor or Councilmember*; Current and former holders of Berkeley elective office*; Paid staff or unpaid interns to the Mayor or Councilmembers*; Family members of the Mayor or Councilmember or their staff; Officers, paid staff, or paid consultants for campaign committees for Berkeley Mayor or Councilmember*; Contractors or subcontractors of the City of Berkeley

* within 2 years of application

Selection of 2021-2022 Independent Redistricting Commission

- District Commissioners - by lottery
- At-Large Commissioners - voted in by District Commissioners
 - Mandated by the City Charter: Must achieve community representation in selection of the five At-Large Commissioners and their Alternates by taking into consideration geographic diversity, race, age, and gender.



Stars indicate approximate residence of IRC Members





Community Participation in Redistricting

A **Community of Interest** is a concentrated population which shares common social and economic interests that should be included within a single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation.

Note: It is not the same as a district.

Communities of Interest can be areas where people...




People can belong to multiple Communities of Interests.

Communities of Interest (COI) are critical in this process

- Identifying COI is a key building block the Redistricting Commission will use in developing the new district boundaries.
- The Redistricting process is intentionally set up to allow the public to give input and have a seat at the table.
- Redistricting impacts communities' access to political power through elections and we can only effectively identify those communities through your help and feedback.

Timeline



Key Milestones

- Driven by the 2022 election.
- City Charter dictates a deadline for approving the final boundary maps; however, there is an earlier, administrative deadline of April 1, 2022 in order to use the new districts in the 2022 election.
- Should the Commission not meet the deadline, the new map would be used for the first time in the 2024 election.
- Pending Commission approval, the final map may be approved in early 2022.
