In March, we held our first sanctioned Division 3 and Women's Wheelchair Basketball Tournament—also the debut for our new women's team—which drew six teams from as far as Florida. We also hosted a youth and recreational wheelchair basketball tournament, followed by a Power Soccer tournament in May.

BORP's 2025 participant survey shows that we continue to have a transformative and unparalleled impact in Berkeley. 98% of participants are satisfied with BORP's programs, and 100% felt treated with respect by staff. 96% said BORP programs helped them make progress toward goals, and 93% reported their needs were fully met. 92% noted improvements in overall health and wellness, and 97% noted new skills and knowledge. Importantly, 98% of participants felt less isolated and 100% felt more connected to their community as a result of their participation. Open-ended feedback highlighted the confidence, skill-building, and deep sense of belonging fostered at BORP. As one participant shared, "There's no one else in the area who provides anything like what BORP does—"

For the HWCA Commissions 2/18/26 Meeting for Review/Editing Suggestions:

Dear Mayor and City Council.

We are writing to **express our opposition** to Council Member Rashi Kesarwani's recommendation that the city of Berkeley adopt a resolution to rescind the following:

- Her recommendation to rescind the reporting process for use of pepper spray because it is too much an administrative burden to the City
- Her recommendation to rescind the restriction on the use of "air support" like helicopters and canine support
- Her recommendation to reinstate the use of tear gas in "limited situations"

These recommendations will allow BPD to unnecessarily adopt the weapons of war against its own citizens and serve to instill fear in Berkeleyans who wish to exercise their rights that guarantee free speech, the right to assembly and peaceful protest.

Additionally, we believe it will create a deep well of mistrust of city leadership.

At the same time, the Chief of Berkeley Police has been illegally withholding information that the director of the police accountability board (PAB) has a legal right to about BPD's police misconduct – to the extent that the Chief is being sued. The voters who supported the creation of the PAB by 85% vote are not getting the legal oversight of police behavior required by law.

The resistance of the chief to cooperate with PAB as mandated by law, coupled with Councilmember Kesarwani's recommendations, undermines the civil rights of our citizens and undermines the will of Berkeley's voters and those who are reside here but who may be unable to vote.

These "tools" should stay rescinded– especially now when our BPD must stand **with** the citizens of Berkeley given the threats posed by ICE, who currently uses these tools of war against citizens around the country.
