# Summary of Age-Friendly Berkeley Committee Findings Phyllis Orrick (Attachment B)

While recommendations are too numerous to list here, the Aging Commission identified as first steps four (4) priority areas and goals for the Action Plan:

HOUSING AND ECONOMIC SECURITY: Develop a continuum of affordable, accessible housing options for older adults to age in their community regardless of their health or status.

TRANSPORTATION AND MOBILITY: Advance a network of public and private transportation (including transit, assistive devices, e-bikes and e-scooters and bicycling and walking) that equitably serves residents and connects them to services, social activities, and employment opportunities.

HEALTH AND WELLNESS: Develop a more integrated system of services and supports that is person-centered and ensures that all residents have the opportunity to engage in health promoting activities.

SOCIAL PARTICIPATION AND CIVIC ENGAGEMENT: Enhance neighborhood cohesion and social connectedness of all Berkeley residents with community events and activities that are inclusive, affordable, and accessible.

• The dire need for Increased outreach. Berkeley residents over 60 currently number approximately 20,000— or 1 in 5 residents. This number doubled in the decade from 2010 to 2020 and is projected to increase at a similar rate well into the future. Given this explosive growth, it is important that all Berkeley households and residences are made aware of the breadth of services available to individuals, their families, and their caregivers. At this time only a very small fraction of those over 60 years of age are receiving materials from the Berkeley Senior Centers and the Division of Aging Services, due to staff and budgetary shortages that have made it difficult to upgrade outreach: for instance, the main communication is via a print newsletter that is mailed to several hundred people, with no way of tracking whether it has been received. We recommend that the City invest in outreach to this growing demographic group.

## This could include:

- a city-wide mailing, similar to the citywide mailings by the City Parks and Recreation Department about activities,
- updating and keeping relevant websites current,
- investing in collecting email addresses and disseminating information by email,
- reaching out to civic institutions and groups to seek their help with outreach to the aging community and their families.

To Whom It May Concern,

I am Carol Denney of Berkeley, California, a 70-year-old three-time cancer survivor. I turned to the courts for help after being repeatedly assaulted by a visitor to my apartment building, a tenant-run nonprofit where I have lived for thirty-five years. I was granted an elder abuse restraining order but wrongly denied its renewal, a case which the Family Violence Appellate Project, successfully appealed at the First District Appellate Court in San Francisco on February 21, 2024.

The appeal (see attached) illustrated the court's failure to apply the correct legal standard creating prejudicial error ( <sup>1</sup>, <sup>2</sup>). The Family Violence Appellate Project and I now return to the lower courts for protective relief. My protective order under both the original and my current elder abuse restraining order would have restored my safety, at least within the building, had it not been for my abuser's decision to sign up as a caregiver entitling him to access due to his employment status in the eyes of both the police and the courts. My abuser has continued his violence and vandalism due to this proximity despite the property managers and owners prohibiting him entirely from the premises. The police have offered no help with this matter.

IHSS is not the technical employer, which, as we understand it, is the IHSS client, a neighbor<sup>3</sup>, who has additional caregivers. We feel IHSS has some responsibility as the entity paying the restrained party who is, under the elder abuse restraining order, supposed to stay at a distance from my home, car, and person, but is unwilling to do so. As it stands, any current order with this employment loophole will create the same dangerous conditions I have been forced to live with for more than six years, assaults which in one case required major surgery and most recently resulted in a concussion.

The legal standard referenced in our appellate brief, that "...the court is not permitted to consider any burdens whatsoever where the underlying abuse was based on physical violence or threats of physical violence...(Ritchie, supra, 115 Cal.App.4th at p. 1290.)" is relevant here. It appears that IHSS's current

policy is does not conform to the priority the law gives to an elder abuse restraining order, putting the protected party and others on the property at considerable, predictable risk.

Please consider supporting a suspension of payment to IHSS workers with elder abuse restraining orders on applicable properties with elder abuse court orders, such as Ms. Denney's premises. Please let IHSS and the Alameda County Board of Supervisors know that you recommend this change to protect vulnerable seniors.

This would simply allow the client to substitute another IHSS worker and protect the tenants, including any protected party, on such a property. The restrained party would be free to work and be paid elsewhere.
