# RE-IMAGINING PUBLIC SAFETY SURVEY CHANGES

- Renamed to "Re-imagining public safety"
- Added Introductory language that includes confidentiality/anonymity, data protection, and City Contact for question
- Deleted Zip Code screener question
- For all Likert Scales- Dropped neutral or unsure options
- Deleted Questions:
  - Related to whether certain races/ethnicities are more likely to be stopped or experience excessive force from BPD
  - About level of support for reduction in BPD's budget
- Added Q2- If respondent indicates they think Berkeley is any option other than Very Safe, asked "For you what would make Berkeley a safer city?"

### RE-IMAGINING PUBLIC SAFETY SURVEY CHANGES

- Q4 Added: victim of street harassment, arrested, family member of a crime victim, involved in traffic collision, and changed "incarcerated" to "spent time in jail"
- Q5 Changed time frame for whether they have been a victim of crime in Berkeley from last 12 months to
   3 years
- Q6 Changed time frame for whether they had contact with BPD from last 12 months to 3 years
- Q11-12:
  - Added open-ended question "Please share examples of when BPD <u>has not worked</u> well in your community."
  - Added an invitation for respondent to describe their community.
- Q14-15 On alternative services and programs to invest in:
  - Added option "employment and youth opportunities"
  - Added open ended question

- Added background information on the Specialized Care Unit pilot
- Added Q16-: How likely are you to call emergency services (9-1-1) in response to a mental health crisis or emergency?

- Q24-Added: Language to reassure confidentiality when providing email address
- Updated all Demographic Questions
  - Added Q25- Whether respondent lives, works, or homeless in Berkeley; or none of the above.
  - Moved Zip Code question to Demographics section


