- 17. CM Robinson: permitting bicycles on sidewalks. There was a consensus among Commissioners present that the proposed ordinance that would allow people of any age to ride bicycles on Berkeley's sidewalks is a very bad idea and that it would, if implemented, very much threaten the safety of pedestrians, especially pedestrians with disabilities.

First of all people will not go 10 miles and hour and single file because there's no police enforcement people will drive crazy they'll go fast and there won't be any work for pedestrians to go industry as including people with disabilities are going to be forced out into the road into the street unless unless I'm mistaken and there's going to be some sort of protected wall protected industry and path because otherwise people are going to be absolutely thrown out into the street. I would like you to share this with the commission. I still would like to come up to come out against us. I think they seem incredibly week actually this is so terrible that they really need to look at why they wouldn't come out against us what about children and churches, you know, I just think Mr. Robinson doesn't have the experience of he's probably never has experience with a broken bowl was using it. You know broken light using a crunch being a parent all of the things. The wisdom that comes with middle age, and older people, you know we have that with them and we know that Pete parents with baby strollers will be knocked the side. Even though it's 10 miles and hour single filed it will not the police enforcement it will be a free for all and will lose their sidewalks and sidewalks or Metro pedestrians not for bikes. I'd like you to show that was the commission you don't have to call me back, but I wanted to let you know I was put out there. It is frankly completely ridiculous nonsense ago and really really dangerous. Thank you.

Auto-transcript of 11/6/23 message (audio available at public meeting):

Hi, Thomas, it's Elizabeth can you please give this email this little work to arena Fisher the chair of the commission on disability. Hello, Rena. I asked Thomas to do this is an HOA accommodations and Thomas I need you to do this seriously. I can't go online. I saw Rachel Robinson 028.22 item for the consent calendar and saw that the item was pulled, but it will be going to the various commissions. This is an outrageous proposal. There is no doo doo safety Wiley sidewalk. Basically was due care there is that doesn't exist there. We wouldn't have asked for a separate pedestrian passed through the aloni Greenway if everything was. Okay, we wouldn't be demanding that. Okay. The second part is you need to Thomas. I'm sorry. If you don't like this but you need to not listen to the staff person directing you how to make how to vote on things you have to have some bones about you and speak up and say. Hello, Ron. This is I talked to to blind people today who were horrified they are terrified. They will be pushed out into the roadway, you know using a white Cane blind they can't see and they could easily be run over and killed because it will be nowhere for pedestrians to go with bikes and electric scooters and electric vehicles take over the sidewalks. I understand this proposal does not include electric vehicles on the sidewalks. However, we know how things are nothing and so forth by the Berkley police around here. Otherwise, we wouldn't have been asking for a separate pedestrian pass through Cedar roads Park and Susie aloni Greenway when electric bikes and electric scooter writer see regular bikes writing a regular bikers writing on the sidewalks they will join in and the sidewalks will actually be in all actuality become bike lanes and Productions will be pushed into the road way and people will be killed is that really what your permission one.

Yes, and I'm continuing also the 88 the Americans with disabilities act the states. If there is any danger then the Americans with disabilities act would cover. This of course, it's dangerous saying disabled people elderly people disability can be and the same on the same side walk with bikes going fast. And of course, we all know the electric scooters will join in so you're causing you're causing violations that don't have to have to happen. You know, yes, I'm trying to get an attorney, but I don't know if I can I'm not a Rich woman Thomas you need to not interfere with their voting decisions.

Re: Rigel Robinson's Sidewalk / Vehicle recommendations

Dear Commissioners,

I am a disabled senior. In my neighborhood the skateboards, scooters, bicycles, and unicycles we routinely try to dodge to navigate simple errands became untenable years ago. The fact that the extant laws are unenforced - but not unenforceable - does not mean that they don't matter. Unless you think, as Councilmember Robinson appears to do, that the lives and safety of disabled seniors and vulnerable pedestrians are unimportant. Unless you think, as Councilmember Robinson seems to do, that the ADA is unimportant. This may not currently be on your agenda. Please put it on. Take a strong, early stand against this thoughtless, dangerous, unconstitutional proposal.

I am from the generation that fought and secured the federal protections of the Americans with Disabilities Act, which would be controverted by Robinson's proposal. I also fought hard, as a life-long bicycle commuter through the direct action of Critical Mass rides, for the recognition of bicycles as **vehicles**, vehicles with every right to the roadway, a recognition which has changed roadways widely in favor of bicycle safety. If safe roadways for the vehicles **that bicycles in fact are** under the law are not enough for bicyclists, by all means they should fight as hard as we did for dedicated bike lanes.

But Berkeley needs to fight much harder for its vulnerable seniors, whose voices are not covered as robustly as the nationwide bike lobby, which not only dominated honest discussion of the safety issues at Gilman and Monterey, they cost us another valuable department director literally unable to navigate the political pressure to accomplish contradictory directives.

Stand up for safety. Stand up for seniors. Stand up for the disabled and physically vulnerable of any age. Stand up for sidewalks as dedicated, safe, pedestrian walkways. Take advantage of this moment to recommend that this proposal not only be flatly rejected, but that signage and enforcement to protect sidewalks as safe spaces to walk be improved so that the legal rights we currently have are, in fact, manifest in our daily efforts to safely get to the market, the post office, the bank, etc. Bicycles, under the law, are vehicles, are capable of being lethal in the best of hands, and do not belong on sidewalks.

Commissioners,

As a senior (75 years old) who walks all over town for exercise, to attend meetings, and to run errands, I beg you to take a position against the illconceived changes CM Rigel Robinson is proposing to the BMC.

1. The language to allow non-electric bicycles on sidewalks on any streets that provide only sharrows (car traffic lanes marked to be shared with bicycles) or have no bike lane markings or infrastructure at all is dangerous. It encompasses almost all streets in Berkeley, whether they are heavily trafficked with cars or not. It even would apply to Bike Boulevards where they are marked as sharrows, even though those streets are specifically picked because they are low stress, and they may have other traffic calming hardscape, like barriers to car entrance.

2. The language to allow 24/7 use of public paths for transportation purposes is a blatant attempt to greenlight the use of the Ohlone Greenway, where it crosses over city park land, as a bicycle throughway, in violation of Measure L (1986), which requires that this type of change be submitted to the voters.

I understand that, as public policy, the City wants to encourage bicycle usage. It should also be encouraging pedestrian activity, but it should take into consideration the needs of the disabled and elderly. It should not do one thing at the expense of the another, especially given that the disabled and elderly are more vulnerable than cyclists.

Making sidewalks unsafe for the disabled and elderly runs the risk of making people more home bound and endangers our health in more ways than just being hit by a bike. Likewise, taking away the right of the disabled and elderly to go to a park simply to enjoy the outdoors, and making it into an exercise of risk assessment, poses the same problem

If you have not already done so, please take a strong stand against CM Robinson's proposal.
