

- Budget surpluses
- <u>Waterfront -> cash cow</u>

# 1990s -2018

### Uses expanded


- new parks & open spaces
- New recreation opportunities
- Budgets strained

### Infrastructure failing

No reserve fund

2019 – Pandemic -> Tipping Point


## Old Infrastructure

# Is the Marina Fund(MF) Treated Fairly?

### **Unfunded CIP**

- Many depts utilize GO bonds MF typically hasn't been included
  - <u>No impact on operating budgets</u>
- Waterfront has no Reserve Fund

State loans -> higher interest rate + matching funds -> drain on operating budget

### Paving & Potholes

- Citywide Public Works
- $\,\circ\,$  Waterfront area Marina Fund
- Some of the worst streets are in the Waterfront area
  - PCI = 31 University Ave (Seawall Dr to Marina Blvd)
  - PCI = 13 University Ave (Marina Blvd West Front Rd
- FY22 Road Reconstruction \$6.2 M
  - Double Tree \$2.5M
  - o CA Gas Tax \$1 M
  - Measures B, BB, T1 \$2.6M

# Is Current Practice Fair?

Maintenance (roads, parking lots, sidewalks, bike paths)

• East of I80 – Public Works (\$140M)

o Except in Parks – Parks Tax (\$14M)

• West of I80 – Marina Fund (\$5.8M)

Public Spaces - Refuse collection & disposal

• East of I80 - Zero Waste picks up trash gratis

○ Except in Parks - \$600K

- West of I80 Marina staff collect trash + \$230K disposal
- Emeryville picks up trash from their marina & parks for free

PRINCIPLE – All Public Spaces in Berkeley should be treated equitably

 Marina public spaces <u>should receive the same free services</u> that public spaces East of I80 receive

# Do Events Generate Revenue?



With high BPD overtime charges

• difficult to generate new revenue

#### Berkeley Waterfront

#### **1913 - State granted land in trust to City**

"Public Trust Revenue" is "any revenue generated from trust assets".

1. Revenue generated within the City's granted lands <u>restricted to lands located</u> <u>within the City's grant</u>.

#### 1980s(?) – Loophole created

- 1. Exempted sales tax, TOT(hotel tax), and other special taxes
  - a) not considered Public Trust revenue and
  - b) not required to be spent on the City's granted lands.

It is within the City's discretion to allocate TOT funds to the Waterfront

- 1. FYs18-20: all taxes generated at <u>Waterfront contributed ~\$11 M</u> to GF
- 2. Now: Waterfront needs help from the GF

# P&W Request is a Compromise

#### Request


- TOT revenue allocated to MF
- other taxes remain with the GF
  - A. Marina fund (\$5.8M)
    - 1. Transient Occupancy Tax (TOT)
  - B. General Fund (\$205M)
    - 1. Property taxes,
    - 2. Utility User Tax
- Sales Tax
  Parking space rental tax

3. Business license

6. Franchise fees

#### Amplifying Effect: TOT revenues of \$1-3M

- small decrease in the GF: 0.5% 1.5%
- large impact on MF: 17% 52%
