CoD Staff Updates

- 1. Re the 2023 Log of Access Complaints that the secretary shares each month as part of his Staff Updates, there was a consensus among Commissioners that:
 - (a) complaints can be removed from the log shared with Commissioners once the complaints in question have both been resolved to the satisfaction of the complainant and been seen by Commissioners as part of a prior CoD meeting's packet;
 - (b) the log should include a column describing the solution implemented by the City;
 - (c) the log should include a column indicating if the complainant was i) satisfied ii) unsatisfied or iii) unknown;
 - (d) the complete log should be available to the Commission if/when requested.
- 2. In response to an access complaint received by the CoB, but covered under Title III of the ADA (not Title II where CoB has jurisdiction) the consensus of the Commissioners is that a letter be sent to businesses (or other Title III entities)

about whom the CoB receives an access complaint. The Commissioners believe that a form letter merged with a description of the accessibility complaint should be sent to the business (or other non-City entity) directing the business to the Pacific ADA Center. The Commissioners believe this will lead to improved access and educate the business community (and others) regarding obligations under the ADA and available resources to assist.

3. The Commissioners expressed interest in working with the California Commission on Disabled Access (CCDA), which has already contacted the Berkeley CoD, to better educate non-City entities on their ADA access requirements and resources available.

Discussion/Action Items

- There was a consensus among Commissioners that audio-only teleconferencing is not sufficient at a Commission meeting involving remote participation, that a laptop-sized video monitor is not sufficiently large, and that a 24" or larger video monitor is necessary to facilitate full participation and communication at Commission meetings.
- After discussing Work Plan ideas and language, Commissioners agreed that any further Work Plan development between now and the CoD's next public meeting would be conducted by individual Commissioners in conjunction with the Chair but no other Commissioners, thus ensuring Brown Act compliance. (Additionally, any two Commissioners can work together without involving the Chair.)

PLEASE OPPOSE THE PROPOSED OHLONE GREENWAY BICYCLE PATH EXPANSION PLAN

Hello Commission Members.

Please note my opposition to the wide, fast moving bicycle & electric scooter lanes the City wants to build in the Ohlone corridor.

The city of Berkeley wants to create wide, fast moving bicycle & electric scooter lanes along the Ohlone Right of Way from Virginia Street to the Albany line. The Plan would remove mature trees & shrink Cedar Rose Park; but would not provide any separate pedestrian pathways, including at the Gilman, Hopkins, Rose & Cedar intersections.

Bicyclists & e-scooter riders do not & will not safely share the Ohlone Pathway w/pedestrians.

Bicycle-pedestrian collisions & near collisions occur daily. Pedestrians, including people w/ disabilities & parents pushing strollers need their own safe ADA compliant pathway, as exists along the nearby West Street Path, and under the BART tracks in Albany.

An ADA compliant pathway should be of an easy to walk or roll on compacted material, not rocks or gravel.

THIS ILL-CONCEIVED PLAN MAKES THINGS WORSE!

Bicycle and e-scooter riders in Berkeley go too fast already. Wider pathways will encourage bicyclists & e-scooter riders to go even faster, putting pedestrians – including people with disabilities – at even greater risk of being banged into, knocked over, & seriously injured.

The willful lack of an ADA compliant path invites bicycle-pedestrian accidents & exposes the City to lawsuit.

The developmentally disabled students who participate in the after school programs at the Ala-Costa Center in Cedar Rose Park will be especially vulnerable to being hit by bicycles & e-scooters.

WHY ARE RECKLESS BICYCLISTS AND E-SCOOTER RIDERS TOLERATED?

Bicyclists and scooter riders are getting more and more reckless. They routinely run stop signs and stop lights, pass pedestrians on the right, and overtly knock into pedestrians. It's time to strictly enforce all traffic laws against bicyclists and e-scooter riders.

Electric scooters should NOT be on sidewalks nor in bicycle lanes. Electric scooter riders should be licensed and at least 18. It makes no sense to exempt them from the rules of the road.

For the above reasons, Paris France recently banned all electric scooter rentals.

DO NOT REMOVE ANY PARKING ON PERALTA AVENUE

The Plan would remove 12 or more parking spaces on Peralta Avenue & more on Hopkins & Rose streets. The pickle ball players at the Hopkins-Peralta courts will grab the remaining nearby parking spaces. People won't be able to park in front of their homes again. High speed bicycle lanes with concrete barriers will keep people from safely backing out of their driveways. People without driveways will forced to park far away front their homes & will risk assault walking or rolling home after dark. Removing street parking on Peralta Ave and on other nearby streets will result in more auto break-ins, more catalytic converter thefts, & more out right car thefts. Catalytic converters can cost thousands of dollars & many months of waiting to replace. Thieves are savvy. They will quickly recognize the loss of street parking on Peralta as an opportunity to break into cars on adjacent streets that belong to Peralta Avenue residents.

The Plan violates the Americans With Disabilities Act – ADA. The city's consultant acknowledged that no consideration was given to the ADA in the development of this plan.

People on Peralta and nearby streets have healthcare workers who assist them at home. Home healthcare workers depend on easily accessible parking. With no place to park, most of these home health care workers will quit. People will lose their critical home healthcare. Their lives will be put in grave danger. Some people could be forced into nursing homes.

There would be no place for the delivery people who bring our food and packages to park.

People with driveways would be forced to back out into high speed bicycle lanes. People without driveways would be trapped in their home. Is this what the City of Berkeley wants?

The Hopkins – Peralta immediate neighborhood recently had a dangerous car-jacking, and a separate August 13 armed robbery with a reckless get-away driver smashing into cars and narrowly missing a pedestrian.

Our neighborhood is getting more and more dangerous. Don't make it even more dangerous by taking away our street parking.

There's no reason to remove our vitally needed parking spaces.

Safe bicycle lanes can & should be designed w/out taking away street parking. Please tell the City of Berkeley to not remove any street parking on Peralta Avenue WHERE'S THE PUBLIC INPUT?

The city is quickly pushing through the Plan now, without public review. We need real public review, before any plan is approved. All we got was a short meeting in February

with a consultant who would not take notes. We need more public meetings & a City Council vote before any plan is approved.

All draft plans should be submitted to the Commission on Aging and to the Commission on Disability before any further action is taken, as these commissions represent constituents who would be most adversely effected by expanding bicycle/e-scooter lanes, and by not having separate pedestrian pathways.

If the project cannot begin until the spring of 2024, what's the rush? Send out postcards to the effected neighborhoods updating them on what is planned & on how to have their voices heard, before any further action is taken.

Please tell the City Council that you oppose the Ohlone Path Plan as currently proposed.

These electric scooter from Berkley. However, right now there would be no protection and was cutting down mature trees to why isn't this alone at Greenway but to not have an 88 compliant path. It's linear and long, but it's not very wide. They're never that why it wouldn't take a lot of space, but it would save a lot of lives. Lastly, we do not want more people becoming disabled. It's a really rough life and I don't want to anybody else to suffer the way. One is at 1321 Gillman 600 feet from my home, which is horribly disabled me and added to a long list of disability including burning skin and burning has hearing last memory loss and horrible things it's done with my rheumatoid arthritis in my joints. I was 600 feet from this I tried to apply to it we were unsuccessful and we're being injured by it. The second thing and very disabled by and the second one is in front of jehovah whiteness on Cedar Street, Rick radiating all this illegally right into the children's top lot at the Park, which I know they're going to run the rate. So according to the City of Berkeley guidelines

on the South towers, you know the introduction of five T they're supposed to be 300 feet from a Park and they are well. The one is on Cedar is 50 feet at most from the Cedar Grove Park that radiates for five G right on the littlest smallest children the one at 1321 Gilman is a fire hazard because it's right in front of Henry's Automotive and you can buy the heat cell towers are very hot and you combined the heat of a cell Tower with a diesel and oil and things as an Automotive repair shop has it makes it much more of a fire hazard to prove the Gilman District. Besides all of the horrible disabling symptoms. It has given us in our home I wanted her to know about this because it's also places you have but those are 88 violations that you probably aren't even aware of because we're the canaries in the coal mine and we are to seniors as important, but this is something happening to my body and many people around here also to add there. I have spoken to young women who are who lives near the 1321. Gillman so power also the 1550 Hopkins 52 cell Tower and the cell Tower in front of jehovah whiteness on Cedar Street. 

SUMMARY OF DESIGN CONSIDERATIONS

Some pertinent pathway issues:

- Pathway currently operates as a <u>shared use</u> path and will continue to operate as such
- Current pathway widths range from 8' (at Cedar Rose Park) to 11' (Rose to Hopkins)
- Bicycle Plan recommends widening to 12' where feasible
- Project will widen pathway to 12' (14' from Virginia to Cedar). Width of pathway through Cedar Rose Park will remain 8'.



SUMMARY OF DESIGN CONSIDERATIONS

- Per State standards, <u>shared</u> <u>use</u> path must be at least 8' wide (10' preferred)
- Pathway grading will comply with ADA to the extent practicable
 - Grading may remain as existing where physical constraints exist: terrain or infrastructure, notable natural feature, or similar physical constraints



SUMMARY OF DESIGN CONSIDERATIONS

- Separated use path requires minimum 17' width per Federal standards
- Numerous constraints restrict pathway width
 - Mature trees, preservation of park space, property boundaries, drainage structures, public art, pathway lighting, etc.
